PASTORAL UPDATE

"I can't wait until this is over."

"I can't wait until we can return to normal."

"I wish we could....."

"I miss being able to....."

If you're anything like me, you've been saying these things, or something similar, on repeat since last March. I can already start to see some things coming back—camp signups for summer are being advertised, schools are making plans to welcome all ages back in person, family weddings for the summer are moving full force ahead. Still, I'm missing writing in coffee shops, eating inside restaurants, meeting with people in person without spotty internet freezing my screen. I'm not sure I'm used to preaching to a camera, even after 9 months. I wish I could see people's facial expressions when I talk to them on the phone. There is a big appeal to rushing back towards the way life was in February 2020 as fast as we're safely able.

Yet, I don't know if that's good or wise. Life didn't stop happening these past several months. It wasn't all for naught. We learned a great deal. Some of what we learned I hope we hold onto. A lot of the way we were doing things back when life was "normal" wasn't working for us anyway. For starters, I think virtual worship and meetings are here to stay. We have been able to expand our reach and broaden our community in ways we weren't able to when we only did things in person. That will continue to evolve and adapt, and I hope we are able to change and adapt with it as we learn to be more effective in our outreach and involvement of others.

This has been a year to try many new things and get creative. Some of the most fun I have had this past year was doing the sermon series with the GoPro, which is why we're doing it again in January. I adored the different ways people gathered outside safely—on walks, on driveways, on porches, at farms,

in lakes. Even signs asking people to wear masks were clever—"to mask or not to mask is not a question. Wear a mask!" (seen in downtown Excelsior) I hope this spirit carries us past the time of social distancing. Working together to solve problems has revealed new thinking that might not have come to be otherwise.

I hope that 2021 won't have us just yearning for the way things used to be, but excited about the new way of life that we're creating together. What new people will we come across? What new ministries will we begin? How might we approach building community, serving others, and standing for justice in ways we haven't tried before? I'm eager to see how this faith community surprises me in 2021 in delightful ways, just like you did in 2020.

It was nine months ago, after the March 29 death of George Floyd that our Social Justice Ministry created an Anti-Racism team to address the issue of Racial Justice. Hopefully in those nine months we have connected with you as you:

- Read our Declaration for Racial Justice committing all of us to this work.
- Read the definitions of terms often used in this work.
- Chose a book or video from our resource list.
- Read the weekly emails including word of the week, quotes & notices.
- Participated in one of several sessions about White Identity and White Privilege.
- Read articles in the EUMC Shoreline.
- Joined with other EUMC members in the monthly St. Luke Dialogues on Dismantling Racism.
- Completed the Church Survey about Racial Justice.
- Participated in Zoom dialogues during October's Bumper Sticker Sermon Series.
- Noticed the *United Methodist Stand Against Racism* banner outside EUMC.

Now we begin the New Year 2021 and we are planning new and interesting experiences for our Congregation.

We will be offering circles and other EUMC small groups dialogue opportunities lead by our team members.

A special *Conversation That Matters* with Thaddeus and Natasha Johnson is in the works. They are a Black couple we connected with through Chris Stone. They live in Atlanta and are both faculty members in the Department of Criminal Justice and Criminology, Andrew Young School of Policy Studies, Georgia State University.

Continuation of our effort to support the work of the Minnetonka Coalition for Equitable Education.

Exploring a connection with the Minnesota Council of Churches Truth and Reparation Initiative's effort.

This is a first in the nation project to heal the deep wounds of racism.

We ask that you make it your New Year's Resolution to seek out a place for yourself in this important Social Justice Ministry. Blessings to all for the New Year.

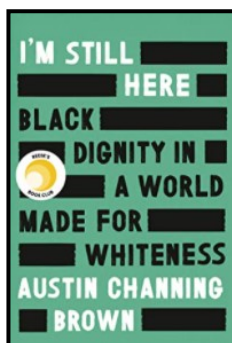

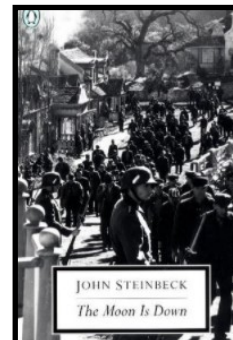

Monday, January 25 - Zoom at 3pm.

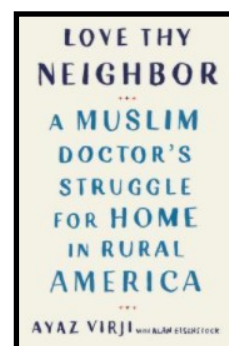
Steinbeck's novel was published in 1942 for the purpose of motivating resistance in occupied countries during WW II. The story starts as a small coastal town in Northern Europe is overtaken by invaders, because of their large coal mine. Little resistance is provided by the town, but the story evolves to tell of how the town's people cannot tolerate being occupied. The theme of Steinbeck's novel is democracy vs totalitarianism. This book is one of the best examples of Allied propaganda of WWII and was published in 92 countries during the war. Susan Dragsten will lead our discussion.

Love Thy Neighbor: A Muslim Doctor's Struggles for Home in Rural America By Ayaz Virji M.D.

In 2014, Dr. Ayaz Virji left the East Coast to practice medicine in the rural town of Dawson MN, because of the shortage of doctors in rural communities. The doctor recounts how he and his family were welcomed until the human consequences and racism of toxic politics following Donald Trump's election. Dr. Virji is ready to leave until a local church pastor gives a sermon on the Islam faith and Islamic beliefs. This is a powerful true story about a Muslim doctor overcoming the climate of racism, hostility, and fear in his community. Lynne Farrell will lead our discussion.

The solar project continues to progress and we look forward to installation and operation by spring of 2021.

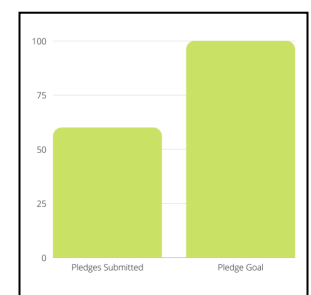
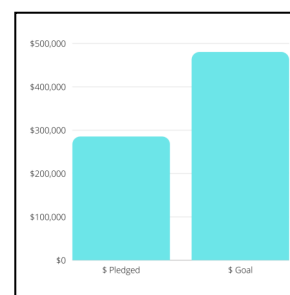
SPRC
