PASTORAL UPDATE

For many people, Lent is the season to "give something up." Common things to give up are coffee in the morning, meat on Fridays, sleeping in on Saturdays. Some take a more difficult approach by trying to give up complaining, gossiping, or selfishness. I once tried a very weak approach to Lent by saying I would give up adding sugar into my tea. I lasted only about a week, when I decided that God didn't really want me to drink bitter tea! I could be faithful AND drink sweetened tea. (At least that's my rationalization for that failed Lenten practice.)

Needless to say, Lent is a difficult season for me. My mood doesn't always match the season—I don't always feel reflective and repentant when it rolls around. Advent is the opposite—I always feel like I'm waiting for something, anticipating the future. That's an easy season for me to practice and connect with, deep in my bones. But Lent is different. I'm very much a person of "more." The more books on my nightstand, the better. The more projects I'm working on, the better. The more sugar, the more activities, the more plans I have, the better. Not very Lent-ish.

I will admit that my first thought when Lent came around this year was, we've already given up so much! We've been submerged in Lent for a year, not just 40 days. What more could we do? What more do we need to give up?

But I think the spirit behind Lent isn't to give something up because it's that time of year. I think the spirit behind it, whether you give something up or not, is to pay attention to how hard it is to let go. How hard it is for us to strip down to necessities. To live and rest in the "less" part of life rather than always in the "more." To practice giving things up to see what happens. Jesus certainly gave up quite a bit during his ministry and his life, and he challenges us to do the same.

What do we discover when we let go? Who do we discover? What gifts lie beneath the clutter that fills our lives? Sometimes I know why something is important or meaningful before I do it. Other times, I find that I need to just do the thing and then discover later the meaning behind it and the importance. Lent is that for me, every single year.

I pray that this Lenten season will be one where you can practice letting go-of clutter in your life, of expectations for how life is supposed to go, of habits that drag you down-to discover anew the presence of God and the gifts that lie in a more simple, bare life. May you find that less really can be more.

Volunteer Spotlight ~ Denise Foote

Meet Denise Foote. Denise is the mastermind behind our Little Free Pantry and is a member of our dynamite Outreach team. She first got the idea for the free pantry at a church she saw in Florida. Denise thought it would be perfect at our church. She is also the Vice President of UMW and serves on our funeral committee. When she's not working the food shelf or restocking the pantry, you're most likely to find her at home cooking or reading. Denise and her husband Doug started attending Excelsior UMC in 1998. They are parents to five boys: Haydn (24), Logan (22), Calvin (21), Declan (19), and Keegan (15).

- What she enjoys about her current volunteer roles: "I can't bear the thought of anyone not having enough food! I love to feed people, so this helps me to do that in a small way. The people on the Outreach Committee inspire me, because they're all hard working and have huge hearts."
- Why this work is important: "It makes me sad that there's a need for the food shelf and pantry, but all kinds of people need help. Because of the pandemic more and more people have food insecurities. We provide a welcoming, nonjudgmental place that people can come to get food and other items like diapers. Diapers are expensive! Our church family specifically is so generous and kind by donating supplies and money. I love being part of a church with people that are so service oriented!"
- Why this work is important: "The clients! One of our clients died of a heart attack recently and I cried with her when his wife told me. He was a very friendly man and I miss seeing his smiling face. A few weeks later his wife made us homemade chicken enchiladas as a thank you for having the food shelf.


Cover Girls Book Club



LEADERSHIP TEAM

This Lent's sermon series, "Unraveled: Seeking God When Our Plans Fall Apart", prompted me to reflect on the past year as we dealt with so many changes in our plans as well as how we think and do ministry. Volunteers, activity leaders and committees have been constantly asking in what ways can we answer God's call given the realities that surround us. Our Leadership Team discussions, actions and decisions hope to in some way help answer these questions as we work together to support the vision and mission of our church. Here are some of the highlights and how we are looking forward:

We met virtually on December 14 and January 26 where we continued to focus on how to make progress on our three main priorities:

- Children's Ministry we are so excited to welcome Kallie Stroh, EUMC's new Children's Director, along with her two boys, Jackson and Aaron. This completes a much needed addition to our staff both now and as we prepare for the future.
- 2. Connections in the last two months we have supported a letter from the Minnetonka Coalition for Equitable Education about social justice and equality issues. We also entered into a partnership with the Wesley Foundation at the University of Minnesota and Peter Cleaveland has recently joined their board. A EUMC Discovery class has been held virtually and new members are joining.
- 3. Virtual Worship we are making progress in planning upgrades to the sanctuary that will support continuation of our current virtual worship as well as options for future live streaming. We are grateful for the generosity of time and talent that makes these next steps possible.

Worship

We continue to monitor and follow the guidelines of Minnesota Annual Conference who takes input from the State of Minnesota as we discuss and plan for returning to in person worship and other activities. At this point, we have no firm date or plans but will communicate in advance as soon as a decision is made. In the meantime, we encourage everyone to keep practicing all of the safety measures even as more and more people receive vaccinations.

Financials

We wrapped up 2020 in a very good position. Even though giving was below expectation, we also were able to manage expenses and put money into our emergency account. On February 28, 2021, we will present the 2021 budget. Just a reminder, we



welcome you to still submit or update your estimate of giving any time during the year which helps with making priorities and decisions regarding the churches finances.

We continue to make progress on updating our website and EUMC branding details that will improve our ability to communicate and connect virtually.
