November Sermon Series

This year has been a struggle for all of us in different ways. A global pandemic has upended us; a global protest around racial justice has unsettled us; a national election has unnerved us. Add to that our personal challenges and changes, it's no wonder that so many of us are exhausted and stressed in a way we never have before. Scriptures is full of challenges, grief, and setbacks. What can it teach us about our own losses and emotions? This month, we want to focus on the need for us to listen and understand one another's struggles, even when they are different from our own. How do we choose to open ourselves up to what others are experiencing and feeling? What does empathy for others look like? For ourselves? How can scripture infuse our thinking and feeling? Join us in worship as we seek to grow in our empathy for all of God's children.

November 8: It's Okay to Not Be Okay. Pastor Brooke leads worship as we reflect on the presence of lament in scripture and the need for it in our own lives.

November 15: The Power of Listening. Rev. Brett Heerwald, the lead staff chaplain at St. John's Hospital in Maplewood (and Pastor Brooke's brother), will join us to guest preach.

November 22: It's In Our Bones. Jordan Harper leads worship, as we explore Jesus' call to radical solidarity and the nature of our relationships with others

"I got out of bed on two strong legs.

It might have been otherwise.

I ate cereal, sweet milk, ripe, flawless peach.

All morning I did the work that I love."

This is the beginning of one of my favorite poems, *Otherwise* by Jane Kenyon. She describes a fairly ordinary day, filled with nothing extraordinary, and yet all of it is extraordinary. So many simple aspects that really are gifts.

So far this morning, I woke up well-rested and healthy. It might have been otherwise.

I enjoyed a hot chai latte and a warm slice of rhubarb pie. It might have been otherwise.

My son asked me to read to him before he got on the bus. It might have been otherwise.

I was able to send my four kids off to school where they will be greeted by loving, caring adults. It might have been otherwise.

I have a closet of clothes that I can choose from to wear each day. It might have been otherwise.

I finished my sermon early. It certainly might have been otherwise!

I spoke with congregation members planning events for the good of our community. I chatted with our staff, who brighten my day. I had another cup of hot tea in my office. I read and planned and wondered about peace and gratitude and Advent and dreams and hope. I too, get to do work that I love.

It all might have been otherwise.

These next two months, I invite you to ground yourself in the specific details that remind you of your blessings. I encourage you to pay attention to all the little things that could be otherwise. Perhaps you will join a small group where we'll be paying attention to the presence of hope or the coming light of Christ. Perhaps you will practice gratitude each day. Perhaps you will invite a friend or neighbor to join you for online worship. Perhaps you will read more poetry. Perhaps you will limit your calendar to make room for ordinary days that remind you it could be otherwise. Perhaps you will move slower and listen more deeply to the world around you, the people around you, the creatures around you. May this be a season of gratefulness and simplicity for you and yours.




November Small Group Notes on Hope November 10, 17, 24 at 2pm and 7pm


Buy a pie, feed a family!

LEADERSHIP TEAM

"Never let a good crisis go to waste." was credited to Sir Winston Churchill near the end of World War II where an unlikely alliance was forged between himself, Stalin and Roosevelt, that led to the formation of the United Nations: an opportunity formed in the midst of a crisis.

The pandemic has pushed all of us to think in different ways. In September, 114 of you filled out a survey that is helping us made decisions moving forward. Some key takeaways:

- Over 50% identified as being over the age of 61
- 73% do not have children in their household
- 62% considered themselves or someone in their

household "high-risk" for Covid-19

• 95% have worshiped with us online since live

streaming began

Almost 60% of responders would not feel comfortable attending worship in-person until there was a viable vaccine

Top priorities named: expanding outreach and social justice ministries, expanding children and family ministries, improving external communication, improving building areas that equip children & hospitality ministries.

One main reason for the priorities questions was to provide input for our goal-setting activity. For the next 12-18 months, we have identified these top 3 areas as our priorities:

1. Children's Ministry – looking for ways to invite & engage, equip various age-groups, identify needed building updates.

2. Connections –strengthen relationships outside of worship, intentionally intergenerational, consider various formats.

3. Virtual Worship and Collaboration – plan and prepare for sustainable & effective online worship moving forward (even post-Covid), build our online community and digital tools, support access for all ages.

Leadership will next work on formulating specific actions to implement in order to achieve these goals.



Virtual Worship

We continue to worship virtually each week. At the January 26th Leadership Team meeting, we will review the situation and evaluate, if possible, when we might begin to phase in in-person Worship services. At present, the Bishop and Annual Conference are encouraging churches to continue with online worship and maintain groups of 10 people or less when gathering in person.

Trustees

The solar panel project continues to make progress as the team is finalizing contract details and schedule.

SPRC

We will hold a EUMC charge conference via ZOOM at 11:45am on November 25th following worship to review and approve Pastor Brooke's salary for 2021.

Finance

Income was down in September but overall we maintain positive cash flow for the year to date. Stewardship drive is planned for November so start considering now how you might best support the ministries of our faith community in 2021. None of this can be done without you.
