# PASTORAL UPDATE

Lent has begun. A season of repentance and fasting, of prayer and reflection, of preparation for Jesus' resurrection. As the writer Kate Bowler says, "we are almost to the saddest part of the year." It is a season of brokenness and grief, a season of not enough and too much.

Our world seems to be matching the liturgical calendar. Hourly news from the Ukraine is giving us too many examples of brokenness and pain. Add to that the continuous news of Israel, Palestine, Syria, Afghanistan and so many other places to which we have become numb. Not enough peace, not enough democracy, not enough lives being protected and saved. Too much greed, too much power, too much violence, too much destruction and death.

As I was struggling to figure out how to respond to the news of the Ukraine, I read these words from the activist Kaitlin Curtice. She calls them the five "R's":

- Receive
- Respect
- Respond
- Release
- Rest

"Receive the information, the news, the realities. Respect what they mean: take note of privilege, of what's happening in your body, of what this means to others. Respond to it. Do what you need to do: donate money, time, write, create art, support others tangibly, or just give them space, too. Listen. Learn. Release it for the moment, holding onto what you've learned and processed. Rest. Rest. And be ready to receive again."

Lately, I've been very heavy on the receiving information and news side. Scrolling and scrolling for more updates, feeling more and more despair and fearful as I read. Got that part down. When I look at how I normally act, I have focused mostly on the first three steps. Receiving, respecting and then responding. Repeat. Where I need to lean into in this season of Lent are the last two-releasing and resting. I'm good at resting and watching basketball on television, but I'm not so good at releasing and resting my brain from its swirls of thoughts. Those can be the most grounding aspects of the process, that remind us we are not alone. It is in releasing and resting that I am best able to remember that God goes before me and after me, above me and below me, in front of me and behind me.

May this Lent be a time of reflection for you and for our world. May each of us make time and space for receiving, respecting, responding, releasing and resting.

## The Excitement is Building!

We have moved into the next stage for our building project. Thanks to those of you who volunteered to participate in our building committee. Throughout the capital campaign, we took notes of the questions and feedback the congregation shared with us. We have given that feedback to Station 19, who is adjusting our plans based on your input. They are also working on structural engineering issues, to ensure that what we want to do is feasible. We will officially vote on our building committee and preliminary architectural plans at our church conference on March 27 at 11am. Please plan to attend!

#### We have selected a Construction partner:

Langer Construction will partner with us and Station 19. Langer has over 76 years of experience and religious organizations account for more than 80% of their projects. They are the ones who did our Columbarium ceiling, so we already have a positive relationship with them.

Over the next 5 weeks, the building committee will meet with Station 19 and Langer construction to:

- Review and confirm floor plan designs
- Conduct a structural engineering assessment and options
- Complete a budget review (Is what we are planning within budget parameters?)
- Update construction timing and impact assessment.
- Review and confirm interior design plans (flooring selection, furniture plans, wall colors, etc)

Another project we hope to begin this summer or early fall is to build a community playground in partnership with the City of Excelsior on the field west of the church. We are applying for a grant from the Hennepin County Youth Sports Program. Our conversations with the Excelsior Rotary and the city have demonstrated very enthusiastic responses and communal support. Both have expressed interest in helping us raise funding for this project. Sarah Nelson is spearheading this endeavor. Stay tuned for more info!







## **LEADERSHIP**

Spring will be a busy time for EUMC and the Leadership Team. As we prepare to enter the season of Lent let me share the highlights of the areas we will be focusing on.

- New Leadership members will join the team in March. There will be a Church Conference on Sunday, March 27 following worship to vote on the new slate of leaders, have an update from the Building Committee and a report on 2022 budget.
- Formation of the Building Committee is complete, and Leadership will liaison with that new committee in areas of Trustees and Finance.
- As shared in worship we are sad that Jordan will be leaving the staff late spring. Leadership has begun working on a plan to replace the three areas that he has responsibility for. Those 3 areas are Youth, Outreach and Finance.
- Jeff Fawbush will be joining our music staff as a songwriter and instrumentalist. He will be partnering with Gail to provide worship music on a regular basis.
- The financing for the existing mortgage has been completed. EUMC has now partnered with Bridgewater Bank for all our monetary needs.
- Update on the playground project has been provided and that project continues to move forward.
  This will be in partnership with the City of Excelsior, Hennepin County, the Excelsior Rotary and
  potentially others. Leadership strongly views this as a positive fulfillment of our mission to Build
  Community, Serve Others and Stand for Justice. Sarah Nelson and Bill Lester are leading this
  project.
- Pastor Brooke will be taking a 6-week renewal leave this summer. The Book of Discipline directs
  pastors to take a short-term renewal leave every four years, in additional to their vacation. This
  leave request comes with the support and backing of the MN Annual Conference and the
  Conference also makes some funds available to cover guest preachers. Leadership Team strongly
  supports this leave and had an excellent discussion about the benefits this brings to both pastors
  and churches when we met with the District Superintendent in December. Dates are not finalized
  but will be mid June thru July or early August.
- Our Ministry Teams have many stories to share with the congregation as they have been working with our children and youth, serving the community, and educating us in February with the sermon series What Matters Most: Urgent Issues for Today. If you missed any of that, take time during Lent to decide what issues really matter to you.

If you have questions for Leadership, please let us know. As we celebrate the resurrection story once again this spring, may you hear the good news and then may you share it.

#### **OUR COMMUNITY**

#### A Typical Day at Our ICA Food Shelf

Many members of our church have donated food, money, and time to the Food Shelf we host on the second and fourth Wednesday of each month. We'd like to walk you through a typical day, giving you a glimpse of the experience our volunteers and those we serve have.

Early in the week ICA is contacted with our requests for specific items according to the needs of our clients. Wednesday afternoon, volunteers arrive to set up tables, the check-in and weigh-in stations, organize the shopping area, and unload the ICA food delivery truck. This process takes an hour or so, even with six or more volunteers.

Once set up is complete, clients are able to enter the building to begin the shopping process. Very generous limits of food are available to each family to take home. No one looking for food is turned away. On an average Wednesday we serve 25 or more families, many of who take home pounds of food, hygiene products, and household essentials.

It takes a village, and we are so grateful for everyone who helps!

### SOCIAL JUSTICE

We spent the month of February talking about the issues that matter most to our community. Climate Justice, Racial Justice, Mental Health and Economic Disparity. These issues can seem so daunting, so huge, so beyond our control, that it is easy to shrug our shoulders and think they are problems that we can't really do anything about. But, by listening to other people's stories, by talking about the needs and concerns of others, we become aware that there are many things that we can do to help lift others up.

Each Sunday during the February, the Social Justice Ministry Team provided a list of suggested resources; books, movies, TED Talk/video discussion, and podcasts to help us learn and to stimulate opportunities for discussion about that Sunday's topic. (We also gave away free books, toilet paper, and chocolate!) You can help by continuing the conversation around these topics with people in your spheres of influence and contact.



Monday, April 25 at 1pm in the Fireside Room "The River" by Pete Heller



#### 2021 in Summary

2021 proved to be a very successful year. We ended the year with a surplus of \$78k. While offering income tracked to budget, we also had incremental revenue as a result of our PPP loan forgiveness (\$44k). Our expenses were roughly \$20k under budget related to both Covid and the timing of filling open staff positions.

#### 2022- A look ahead

2022 will be a very exciting year on many fronts. Transforming for Tomorrow will continue to be a key focus and we will begin to realize the benefits of our commitments. We are committed to increased financial support of our outreach, youth and children's programming to deepen connections in both our congregation and community. We are also excited to share that we recently refinanced our mortgage (current balance of \$412k) and were able to reduce our borrowing rate from 5% to 4.25% for the next 10 years. We will provide an update on the 2022 budget in the coming weeks.
