PASTORAL UPDATE

It's a good time for me to reset and focus on what actually brings me renewal and refreshment. I plan to do a lot of reading, writing, napping, running, and walking around the Arboretum. It's starting! Beginning June 6, construction will officially begin on Phase 1 of our remodel. Phase 1 includes the lobby, offices, upstairs kitchen, and children's spaces. This is scheduled to run through September. We hope to have access to our main doors and lobby for most of that time. Worship will remain in the sanctuary until Phase 2 begins, and coffee has moved downstairs. Staff offices have been relocated to the ICA room at the bottom of the stairs. Pastor Brooke's office has been relocated to the middle school room (directly below the old toddler room).

Phase 2 will be the sanctuary, and that is scheduled to happen September thru December.

During the construction period, please call ahead to make an appointment to come into the church building during the week. Staff hours will be flexible, depending on the construction process and noise levels.

A big thank you to everyone who helped us move at the end of May! We could not have done this without you. Many hands make light work!













LEADERSHIP

Welcome to summer! Summer is an exciting time, especially this year at EUMC as we begin our church remodel! The goal of the remodel is to help us better meet our mission to Build Community, Serve Others and Stand for Justice. The Leadership Team is excited for all new possibilities the building changes will offer. Here are some spring highlights and things to watch for moving forward:

- Easter weekend was exciting with over 60 kids participating in the Saturday egg hunt and 110 people from our congregation and the community sharing time at our community lunch. Services included 50 more in-person participants than in 2019 with 97 families watching virtually.
- We continue to oversee the funding and construction details for the remodel. See the Building Team article for more information.
- In May, we celebrated Jordan Harper's time in ministry with us as Youth Ministries leader, Director or Community Engagement, and Financial Treasurer. We wish him and his daughter, Magnolia, well in their next adventure.
- Beverly Eckhardt joined the staff to fill the Financial Treasurer position. Welcome Beverly!
- We continue to search for a new Youth Minister and Community Engagement liaison. If you know anyone with skills in these areas, please direct them to any member of the leadership team.

- SO-HI Community Playground. After receiving approval from the City of Excelsior to place this community playground on our property, we're now working on securing 501c3 status so the park can be a separate entity from the church and receive funds for the project. Celebrate Juneteenth

is the oldest nationally commemoration of the ending of slavery in the United States. June 19, 1865 marks the day when federal troops arrived in Galveston, Texas in 1865 to take control of the state and ensure that all enslaved people be freed The troops' arrival came a full two and half after the years signing the Emancipation Proclamation. Juneteenth honors the end to slavery in the United States. On June 17, 2021, it officially became a federal holiday. To Black Americans it is their Independence Day.

EUMC's Anti- Racism Team notes that Juneteenth is for us both a day to remember what happened to Black Americans during slavery and the Jim Crow era and to celebrate what they have overcome. Let us truthfully acknowledge a period in our history that shaped and continues to influence our society today. Take time to listen to the voices of those who lived this history.



OUR COMMUNITY

Outreach Team Demonstrates Love for Neighbors

The Outreach Team is the driving force behind several EUMC programs—the food shelf, Little Free Pantry, and Community Lunch—that demonstrate how our church strives to show love for our neighbors. The free pantry is located on the east entrance to the church parking lot. A sign on the pantry door invites everyone to take what they need or leave something to share.

Steady use of the pantry, started in spring 2020, has required the Outreach Team to refill its shelves seven days a week, explains team member Wendy Judd.

She said the manager of the apartment building across the street told her she noticed a person getting stuff from the pantry late one night, and "thought, How does that little church provide that service every day? She was *amazed*."

The food shelf has a dedicated room in the church, complete with refrigerator and freezer, where clients pick out food and household necessities. The program, run in partnership with the ICA, is offered twice monthly.

"Every pickup, we hear comments like 'I don't know what my family would do without this,' 'This is how we make ends meet at the end of the month,' and 'God bless you'," Wendy says.

She tells of one client, "a wonderful woman whose husband died a couple of years ago," who, in order to ease her loneliness, cooks food for her neighbors and takes it to them.

"At Christmas, we gave \$20 Target gift cards to every family that came," Wendy says. "They were so grateful, you would have thought the cards were worth \$200."

The team keeps close ties with His House Foundation, a local nonprofit agency that serves families in need. Martha, one of its founders, "has a knack for showing up right when people need her most. She lines them up with the appropriate resources that make a huge impact on their lives."

Recently, a food-shelf client received a call from her son who was being treated in an emergency room. Martha, with help from a Spanish-speaking interpreter, walked the woman through the steps she would need to pay the hospital bill.

"Working with the Outreach Committee has been a real blessing to me," Wendy says, but the biggest blessing is the members of our church.

"Every time we ask for help, you provide it. People will go online and donate \$50 for the Little Free Pantry. Food, hygiene supplies and money are just a request away. Thank you! Through you, we are 'Loving Beyond Ourselves'."



SOCIAL JUSTICE

Caring for the planet and for one another

Excelsior United Methodist is all solar! Since April 5, 2022, the solar panels on the church rooftop have been generating more than 100 percent of the electricity that our church uses.

The process of converting to solar energy took several years of work, with members studying contracts, talking to other churches, consulting energy/utility experts, finding and securing alternative financing when the first option became unavailable, and working with the installation contractors and the energy company to make "Solar EUMC" become a reality.

It began in 2019 when members of the Social Justice Team learned about a program run by Minnesota Interfaith Power & Light (MNIPL) to help faith communities finance the installation of solar arrays on their facilities.

Members of the Social Justice Team believe that using solar energy fits with EUMC's purpose statement, "Loving Beyond Ourselves" and its mission, "to share God's love by building community, serving others, and standing for justice."

Through MNIPL, the church was connected to a special loan program to fund the panels. The annual payment for the loan is less than the church's previous yearly electricity costs. In addition, over the next 20 years, the church is projected to save \$1,000 to \$2,000 a year over previous electricity costs. Over the 30-year expected life of the panels, the total electric cost savings is expected to be \$100,000.

"Saving money isn't why we went solar," says Bill Lester, chair of the Social Justice Team. "The real money savings are 20 years down the road. But reducing our fossil fuel use to zero begins today; the impact we have on those most affected by climate change begins today; EUMC's commitment to climate justice continues, today."
